	Description	-	The present study was an all-India study dealing with various aspects of the trainin programmes organised for social educatio workers at different levels, covering the period 1953-66.

Data were collected from the following sources.

- (a) The training centres for training social education workers at the district and block levels.
- (b) Principals/directors of training centres mentioned under (a) above.
- (c) Officers-in-charge of social education in the central ministries and departments of states and union territories.
- (d) Ex-trainees of the training centres mentioned under (a) above.

The population of the study consisted of training centres (19), officers-in-charge of social education and allied fields in the central ministries (6), and ex-trainees of the training centres for district and block level social education workers (2,199). The sample selected consisted of 100% of training centres and central and state level officers and 10% of the ex-trainees.

Data, both quantitative and qualitative, related to the particulars of the training centres, objectives of the training programmes of the trainees, planning of the training programmes, main aspects of the training programmes, syllabuses, methods and material of training, particulars about the trainees and the instructional staff, inter-personal contacts at the training centres, interrelationships between the training centres, the nearby development blocks and the state, follow-up of ex-trainees, general assessment of the training programmes, and possible ways of improving them further.

Data were collected through questionnaires, interviews, study of records and observations.

	Main Aims of Project		The literature concerning youth and the many conferences devoted to youth problems reiterate a theme of frustrated youth as the source of future political and social turmoil in the new nations of Africa. The studies of education and social change that focus on school leavers, though useful, give a faulty impression of youth at large because they ignore non-schooled or little-schooled young people - a significantly large group in most African countries. As yet, no one comprehensive study of youth as a whole has been undertaken in an African nation. It is this gap the Uganda Survey seeks to fill.
	Description	-	To understand the total picture of youth in present-day Uganda, we will also look at:
			(1) youth in both an urban and a rural area and youth in the rural-urban network, the factors that influence some youthsto leave the rural community and others to stay, the challenge of rural development, the adaptation of youth to urban life;
			(2) the differences between educated and non- or little-schooled youth, especially the informal patterns of learning and

found to facilitate their social mobility and ability to integrate into modern Uganda;

- (3) the different experiences and lifestyles of young people;
- (4) the work situation, the ways youths look for jobs, the types of job they seek, how their aspirations change over time, the effects of unemployment, informal patterns of employment, the perceptions of youth regarding educational and occupational opportunities;
- (5) the factors that facilitate or block a "modern" outlook on the part of youth, the differences between parents and their children, the directions of youth's ideas, and so forth.

The survey derives its research patterns from a pilot project which has been carried out in a rural area about twelve miles from Kampala. This project has demonstrated that a wider youth survey is possible. Thus far, we have completed (a) a thorough demographic survey of the village (approximately one hundred and fifty families) through which present youth, and youth who have migrated from the village, have been identified, (b) interviews with young people covering the subjects listed above, and (c) development of a questionnaire to be pre-tested in other locations before applying it in the village and elsewhere. The questionnaire will determine family backgrounds, educational backgrounds, past and present educational and occupational aspirations, mobility patterns, personal satisfactions and dissatisfactions, uses of time, friendship patterns, relations with parents and adults, occupational histories, involvements in agricultural and rural development, experiences with and perceptions of youth programmes, economics of youth, whom youth will take advice from, socialisation, and a series of attitude questions which will be compared with adult responses.

The phases of the expanded Uganda Youth Survey, an outgrowth of the

earlier project, include (A) location of three villages outside Arua, Kampala and Mbale, at least eight miles from town so that daily commuting is a bit expensive and a decision must be made concerning rural or urban residence; (B) a demographic survey of all households (at least four hundred) to identify the youth of the villages; (C) administration of a questionnaire to a random sample of the villages' adults (for comparisons with youth); (D) administration of a questionnaire to available youth from the villages (both in the villages and elsewhere); (E) preliminary analysis of the data; (F) follow-up study and final analysis of data; and (G) writing up the project results.

A number of Makerere University sociology students have been working on the Uganda Youth Survey, and youth from the three areas where research has been going on have also joined in the project.

Field work has been carried out mainly during the Makerere vacations, March to June, with a follow-up in 1971. A workshop was held at the end of June, 1970.

			The research outline spelt out the magnitude of the task involved in the survey. The construction of a research instrument took into consideration a spectrum of common natural phenomena, e.g. rain, thunder, lightning, rainbows, etc.
			In validating the research instrument, two "try-outs" were carried out. A number of non-literate adults in lle-Ife were subjected to the instrument. And, on the basis of statistical analysis of their responses, the instrument was modified. The modified instrument comprising, forty question-item, was applied on ninety-eight randomly selected non-literate adults of ljebu and Ekiti divisions of the Western State

of Nigeria. Amongst other things, the itemanalysis of the question-items reveals that the modified instrument is sufficiently discriminatory.

It is hoped that this modified instrument will be "used" on about 2,000 randomly selected non-literate adults from the five major sub-ethnic groups in the Western State of Nigeria during the summer vacation. Further work on this project will entail the training of a number of research assistants as field workers. And efforts will be made to find out whether there are significant differences in the responses of the subjects in relation to sex, geographical location (rural and urban), occupation and age-group.

Data will be analysed with the aid of the University of Ife Computer Centre.

The method will be in-depth interview using interview schedules, probe lists and tape recorder. Inspection of the data will yield a suitable minimum time limit for learning projects in Accra. Projects will be classified according to agent of direction: self, group or object. The learning resources of each category of planner will be established.
