Main Aim of Project

- To find out the extent to which young skilled workers in Zambia are adjusted to the demands of modern factory work, to study the nature of such technological modernisation, and to identify the background factors (including technical training) responsible for successful adaptation.

Description

- The project included several levels of enquiry. First, the literature on the subject was surveyed for background information and clues to fruitful lines of enquiry. This was followed by an attempt to consider the issues from the angle of planners and administrators of technical training. Thereafter, a sample of five

work-plants in and around Lusaka were selected. In each of these places, information about adaptation to modern technical work was collected from a sample of workers, below and above the average level. The whole investigation was completed by visiting the rural communities from which some of these workers came, and by obtaining more detailed facts on their early environments and experiences, changes in the patterns of infant care, structures of communities, equipment in homes, and educational and occupational differences by generation.
