# **Commonwealth Secretariat**

The Commonwealth Secretariat is at the service of all member countries of the Commonwealth. It is the main agency for consultation and the exchange of information among them and is responsible for several programmes of co-operation.

Mr Shridath Ramphal, former Minister of Foreign Affairs and of Justice of Guyana, heads the Secretariat as Commonwealth Secretary-General. He was selected by Heads of Government in 1975 to succeed Mr Arnold Smith of Canada who became the first Secretary-General in 1965. Mr Ramphal is assisted by two assistant secretaries-general.

One deputy has responsibilities covering international affairs, legal co-operation, information, applied studies in government, administration and conference services. The other oversees divisions concerned with economic affairs, export market development, and food production and rural development. One assistant secretary-general supervises work in education, health, scientific and youth fields; the other, as managing director of the Commonwealth Fund for Technical Co-operation (CFTC), is in charge of technical assistance.

Independent member governments meet the costs of the Secretariat through agreed contributions, related to population and national income. Its budget for 1979-80 is £2,730,810. The Secretariat administers the CFTC and the Commonwealth Youth Programme (CYP) and works closely with the Commonwealth Science Council (CSC). These are funded separately by governments on a voluntary basis. The CFTC has a plan of expenditure for 1979-80 of £13.5m. The CYP and the CSC have budgets of £900,000 and £170,000 respectively.

The Secretariat has some 350 staff from over 20 countries. Its work reflects the major interests of member nations. It services the Commonwealth in its collective efforts to advance international consensus on global issues, provides information to assist governments in formulating policy, and helps co-operation between countries.

International affairs Consultation between governments on international issues is a vital aspect of Commonwealth activity. Heads of Government meet every two years; in the intervening years there are meetings of senior officials. Of special concern to the Commonwealth is the southern African situation; the Secretariat services the Commonwealth Committee on southern Africa, through which governments regularly review their efforts to assist the people of Zimbabwe and Namibia to independence. The Secretariat has observer status at the United Nations and liaises with UN agencies, and other international and regional organizations.

Economic affairs Economic issues are discussed at annual meetings of finance ministers. The study of policy issues - related to the new international economic order, trade, finance, industrialization, regional co-operation, commodity arrangements, the Lomé Convention, etc. - form a major part of the work of the Economic Affairs Division; it is supplemented by the collection and analysis of statistical data, mainly on commodity production and trade.

**Technical assistance** The Secretariat assists development through the CFTC, to which all member nations subscribe. The activities of the CFTC are described in Appendix II which follows.

Export market development Developing countries are assisted in a variety of activities including market surveys, trade fairs and missions. the setting up of institutions for export development, production modification, design, packaging, standards, and the training of staff in market analysis, marketing and trade negotiation. The Division is financed by the CFTC.

Food production and Rural development A division set up in 1975 helps Commonwealth co-operation in food production and rural development. Measures to promote the manufacture of simple machinery in developing countries and their wider use and exchange, and to reduce post-harvest losses of food crops have been among its main concerns. Increasing attention is being given to livestock farming, fisheries, and project preparation.

Science and technology The Secretariat works closely with the CSC in promoting scientific collaboration by developing regional programmes for joint pursuit by member countries. Each programme comprises action-oriented projects in areas such as alternative energy resources, rural technology measurement standards, quality control, and the utilization of national products.

Education Triennial meetings of Commonwealth education ministers determine the priorities for the Secretariat's work in education. Co-operation between member states is undertaken through regional training activities in areas such as teacher training, book production and development, industrial education and training, educational administration and supervision and science teaching. Publications on current professional issues are produced.

Medical Besides providing technical assistance, including advice on health manpower planning and help with the training of health staff, the Secretariat undertakes studies on matters of concern to health ministries. Recent examples include the medical brain drain, the procurement of drugs, the maintenance of medical equipment, abortion law, the use of auxiliary health workers and health education for young people. The Secretariat maintains liaison with the WHO, and works closely with regional health groupings. Health ministers, who meet every three years, set guidelines for Secretariat activity.

Law Law ministers and Attorneys-General discuss matters of common interest and avenues for co-operation at regular meetings. The Legal Division keeps governments informed of relevant developments in the countries within the Commonwealth through the quarterly Commonwealth Law Bulletin. Legislative drafting, law reform, taxation policy, and cooperation in extradition and the reciprocal enforcement of judgements have been among the areas of recent activity.

Youth The Commonwealth Youth Programme supports the efforts of governments to involve young people in activities serving national goals. It operates three Youth Development Centres serving Africa, Asia and the Pacific and the Caribbean. These provide training for youth leaders and officials engaged in community development. The CYP also offers an information service and advises governments on youth programmes.

Applied studies in government This programme provides opportunities for study and exchange of experience among senior administrators throughout the Commonwealth. Its activities include seminars, training programmes, studies and publications, and the provision of advisory services to governments on public administration and management.

Information The Secretariat seeks to make more people aware of the nature, activities and value of the Commonwealth. It does so through a wide range of publications, a news and feature service for newspapers, and a monthly radio-tape programme.

# **Commonwealth Fund for Technical Co-operation**

The Commonwealth Fund for Technical Co-operation is a multilateral agency set up in 1971 within the Commonwealth Secretariat to provide technical assistance - advice, experts and training - to Commonwealth developing countries.

Unlike traditional aid agencies operated by the wealthier nations, the CFTC is a co-operative endeavour of all its members. Its resources are contributed by both developed and developing member countries, with the latter playing a dual role as donors and recipients.

Started on a modest basis with first-year resources of £400,000, the CFTC has grown rapidly. A steady increase in subscriptions from governments, which are made voluntarily, reflects wide acknowledgement of its usefulness to developing countries in their development efforts. Expenditure has doubled on average each year, rising to £9.74 million in 1977/78 and to a planned figure of £13.5 million in 1979/80.

CFTC assistance is provided under three main programmes covering:

- the supply of experts and consultants to advise governments or fill specific posts; and
- arrangements for the training abroad of personnel from developing Commonwealth countries; and
- assistance for the promotion of exports.

Experts are provided under a General Technical Assistance Programme which also covers the use of consultancy firms to provide advice or prepare feasibility for governments. More than 300 long-term experts (serving for six months or more) were on CFTC assignments in mid 1979.

Experts currently in the field include accountants, agriculturists, airport officers, architects, auditors, bankers, economists, engineers, harbour masters, lawyers, lecturers, librarians, managing directors, medical officers, pathologists, professors, quantity surveyors, statisticians, tax assessors, and a university Vice-Chancellor. Among the fields in which other advisers are providing assistance are audiovisual aids, broadcasting, education, electronic data processing, environment, handicrafts, industrial development, insurance, irrigation, port administration, railways, ship-building, telecommunications, and tourism.

It is CFTC policy to make the widest use of experts from developing member countries, and their proportion within the total has risen to around 50 per cent. Experts have been drawn from 25 Commonwealth countries.

A roster is maintained of experts who wish to be considered for assignments; where necessary, advertisements calling for applications are placed in publications circulating within the Commonwealth. Experts are recruited only to meet specific requests from governments, and only nationals of Commonwealth countries are employed.

Short-term advisory assignments in certain key fields are undertaken by the CFTC's Technical Assistance Group, a team of specialists (in economics, fiscal matters, law, and statistics) on the headquarters staff. They are particularly active in advising governments on the legal and financial aspects of exploiting natural resources like oil and minerals, including the negotiation of agreements with foreign investors.

The Education and Training Programme meets requests from governments for the training of their nationals through courses, attachments and study visits in other Commonwealth developing countries. About 700 projects, many involving several students, were supported in 1978/79. Study in developed member countries may be supported where suitable training facilities are not available in developing countries and under bilateral programmes. Training programmes are sometimes arranged to complement the work of experts provided under the CFTC.

The third major programme of assistance financed by the CFTC focusses on **Export Market Development**, and supports a wide range of activities geared to the promotion of exports. both of commodities and of manufacturers. It has benefited countries with an established industrial sector as well as those in the early stages of industrialization.

Surveys have been commissioned for several countries to determine the export potential for specific products in both Commonwealth and non-Commonwealth markets. Advice has been given on such matters as the creation of national organizations for export promotion and export credit and insurance, packaging and labelling, export documentation, standardization and quality control, design and marketing.

A successful initiative has been the development of an export promotion in which the selection of manufacturing units with export capacity and intensive research in the target market are followed by a trade exhibition at which potential buyers are invited to meet exporters. Buyer-seller meets of this kind, held in New York, Los Angeles and Chicago to promote Indian exports to the USA, yielded immediate orders to the value of \$30 million. A similar project has helped Malaysian exports to Britain, and buyer-seller meets are planned for Sri Lanka, Kenya and Jamaica.

The CFTC also finances the work of the other divisions within the Commonwealth Secretariat concerned with food production and rural development, and public administration. In addition it supports training courses and training-oriented seminars and workshops organized by the Secretariat in the fields of education, health, law and science.

The CFTC has responsibility within the Secretariat for co-ordinating a Commonwealth programme of educational support for Zimbabwean refugees, and administers a trust fund from which scholarships are provided for them to study in developing Commonwealth countries. It also provides educational assistance to Namibian refugees, and administers a special Commonwealth fund for technical assistance to Mozambique.

**Regional co-operation** is supported through such organizations as the Caribbean community, the South Pacific Bureau for Economic Co-operation, and two regional health secretariats in Africa, operating from Nigeria and Tanzania. The CFTC also collaborates in projects benefiting Commonwealth countries with other international organizations like the International Trade Centre in Geneva, the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, the Economic Commission for Africa, and the Agence de Co-operation Culturelle et Technique.

Support is also given to training activities of benefit to member countries undertaken by other Commonwealth bodies, including nongovernmental organizations, like the Commonwealth Science Council, the Commonwealth Broadcasting Association, the Commonwealth Magistrates Association, the Commonwealth Nurses Federation and the Commonwealth Association of Surveying and Land Economy.

Besides developing countries which are full members of the Commonwealth, countries which are associated states or dependent territories of members are eligible for CFTC assistance.

Finance and management Contributions to the CFTC are made in annual subscriptions, the financial year being from 1 July. There is no agreed scale of contributions: each government decides how much it provides. The largest contributors for 1978/79 are Canada, Britain, Australia, Nigeria and New Zealand.

Developing countries may make their contributions in whole or in part in local currency. Such payments are used for CFIC expenditure within the particular country. For operational experts, recruited to fill specific posts, as against those on advisory assignments, receiving countries make an additional payment to the CFTC equivalent to the local salary of the post.

A Board of Representatives, with one memoer from each participating country and an elected chairman, meets twice a year to set CFTC policy. A smaller Committee of Management, with the Commonwealth Secretary-General as chairman, meets more frequently to provide detailed guidance.

The CFTC's chief executive is its Managing Director, who is responsible to the Secretary-General and is an Assistant Secretary-General in the Secretariat.
